Everyone counts.

The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once, and in the right place.

It's abour fair representation.

Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.



It's abour fair redistricting.

After each decade's census, state officials redraw the boundaries of the congressional and state legislative districts in their states to account for population shifts.



\$675 billion

The distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds, grants and support to states, counties, and communities are based on census data.

That money is spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works and other vital programs.





The Library's taxing authority comes only through the Rocky River Board of Education which, at the request of the Library, places periodic ballot issues before the public.

RRPL has a seven-member Board of Trustees, consisting of community members, which is the governing body authorized by the State of Ohio to establish policies and develop an annual budget. All Board and committee meetings are open to the public.
